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1776 – The Book:

180 AD: Emperor Lucius Aurelius Commodus

- Played by Joaquin Phoenix in the film, "Gladiator"
- Unlike Roman Emperors Caligula and Nero, Commodus was not a psychopath but was a malignant narcissist
- His father, Marcus Aurelius, loved him and made him coemperor at 15
- At 19, he became sole emperor and began dismantling the empire.





How Commodus Destroyed the Empire:

- He sought to eliminate all conflict through negotiation and capitulation
- He was a narcissist who presented himself as a god. No one could disagree with the Emperor.
- He encouraged incompetent and corrupt sycophants and idealogues in high office
- Due to his lies, narcissism, and incompetence, people lost faith in the office of Emperor.
- The military took over under the Severans, a dynasty of full-fledged military dictators.

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Gibbon's Theory on the Decline




Why Rome Collapsed

- There was gradual <u>loss of civic virtue</u> among its citizens. The citizens demanded to be served by the Rome, rather than to serve Rome.
- The <u>family unit</u> collapsed, leading to a declining birth rate.
- <u>Romans, Gibbon believed, had become</u> <u>effeminate</u>, unwilling to live a tougher, "manly" military lifestyle. <u>Homosexuality was praised</u>.
- They had become weak, <u>outsourcing</u> their duties to defend their Empire <u>to barbarian mercenaries</u>, who then became so numerous and ingrained that they were able to take over the Empire.
- The <u>currency was devalued</u> and <u>inflation</u> decimated their economy.



Christians Suffered

- From Emperor Nero in 60 AD until Emperor Diocletian in the early 300s, Christians were persecuted.
- On February 24, 303, Diocletian's first "Edict against the Christians" was published. Diocletian ordered the destruction of Bibles and churches across the entire Roman empire.
- A city in Phrygia, consisting entirely of Christians, was burnt, and all the inhabitants perished in the flames.
- Many Christians had their ears cut off, their noses slit, their right eyes put out, their limbs broken, and their flesh seared in conspicuous places with red-hot irons.




Christianity Flourished as the Empire Died



306 AD – 337 AD Constantine the Great

- First Christian Emperor
- Former Pagan
- Edict of Milan in 313 declared tolerance for Christians
- Ushered in a form of authorized Christianity.
- 324 Defeats Maxentius and Licinius
- 325 Convoked Council of Nicaea and made the empire a Christian empire
- 327 Helena sent to Palestine to oversee church building
- Pagans moved into the church
- The gladiatorial games continued.

Gibbon Wrote to Warn England

- Gibbon's concern was the decline of his own nation of England. The British Empire would ultimately collapse in 1946 as a result of its overwhelming debt.
- Impending bankruptcy forced it to borrow from the United States, having depended on U.S. power to bail it out of WWII. Ultimately, it ceded its position to America, who owned its debts, and had the military power.
- The British Pound would be replaced by the U.S. Dollar as the reserve currency of the world
- The irony was that shortly after Gibbon wrote the first volume, a new nation was conceived and begun in 1776.
- And as Gibbon warned about what causes a nation to fail, our founders had different thoughts than the Romans on what can build a nation.
- God had moved His focus to America

The Great Prayer of 1776

- Two years before the colonies declared their independence from England, the continental congress made its very first official act a call to prayer.
- In March of 1776, in a time of impending war and distress, our founders determined to cast off the restraints of a far off government and its ruler who sought to tax them at unheard of levels and remove from them their God given rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.
- On March 16, 1776, General William Livingston presented a resolution for national prayer which passed unanimously. On that day, the continental congress appointed the third Friday of May, -May 17 – 1776 as a day of humiliation, prayer and fasting for all the colonies.
- And so indeed the people prayed and fasted in every colony on that third Friday in May 1776. And it is therefore no surprise that six weeks later, the declaration of independence became the base document of our nation, perhaps the greatest document in the history of the world. It was composed and America was founded as a result of this prayer.



The Testimony of History

- A few brave men and women were in fact able – through prayer, sacrifice and perseverance - to free an entire nation from the domination of an ever expanding and out of touch government. The secret however was not in the crowds on the street, but rather, the small groups that bonded on their knees. We were founded by men and women of deep faith who prayed across denominational lines and begged God to intervene in their defense.
- And the testimony of history is this: God answered their prayer.

Thine is the Power...
